LIFEBOAT 15: DISCUSSION QUESTIONS & ONLINE QUESTIONNAIRE*

Post-Simulation Discussion Questions

As with simulations in general, perhaps the most useful outcomes are in the discussion following. Sufficient time should be left for discussion of what the participants have learned from playing the simulation. The following questions are intended as a starting points for discussion, although each operator may wish to emphasize questions suited to his or her purposes.

- •Who took charge or leadership? Did anybody?
- •Were men more dominant in the game than women?
- •Were sick or injured persons at a disadvantage in terms of their influence on decisions?
- •Did you assume that certain values or attitudes would be expressed according to the characteristics of roles?
- •How much effort was spent on calculating probabilities and trying to minimize risk?
- •How much time and effort was spent on ethical and moral matters?
- •How much self-interest, as against collective interest, was expressed by players? How much altruism (e.g., in distribution or sharing of boat energy chips)?
- •How does the simulation illustrate the differences between the "technical" aspects of decision-making and the moral or ethical aspects of the consequences of decisions?
- •What are some of the relationships between the features of the simulation and "real world" situations?
- •What aspects of the simulation might you change? What would you attempt to illustrate or simulate by such changes?
- •In what ways were the conditions in the simulation like or analogous to conditions in society?
- •In what ways were the conditions not like society?
- •Were decisions made democratically?
